Symposium: Living the Land Ethic in Kansas

On Saturday, March 18, 2017 from 8:30 a.m. to 4:15 p.m., the Dyck Arboretum of the Plains will host its 11th annual spring educational symposium focused on living a Kansas land ethic. Collectively, "the land" in Kansas represents an immense array of natural resources for which we are very fortunate to be temporary stewards. Appreciating the value of these resources, educating ourselves about their

complexities and vulnerabilities, learning how to be good caretakers, and making it a priority to pass them along in good shape to future generations should be important to all Kansans.



Our expert speakers will first tell the story of the rich elements of soil, vegetation, and wildlife that make up our prairie landscape. Then, seasoned practitioners will tell their stories of how we as humans are such important stewards for carrying forward both natural and human resources. We will finish with a message of ingenuity, sustainability, and hope.

Summer Soirée to Feature Leopold Expert Curt Meine

The board and staff of the Dyck Arboretum are pleased to announce that our guest speaker for the 5th Annual Summer Soirée on Thursday, June 29th, from 6 to 9 p.m. will be Aldo Leopold biographer Curt Meine.

Curt Meine is a conservation biologist and writer based in Sauk County, Wisconsin. He serves as a senior fellow with the Chicago-based Center for Humans and Nature and with the Aldo Leopold Foundation in Baraboo, Wisconsin; as a research associate with the International Crane Foundation (also in Baraboo); and as an adjunct associate professor at the University of Wisconsin-Madison.

He has authored and edited several books, including the biography *Aldo Leopold: His Life and Work* (reissued in a new edition in 2010) and *Correction Lines: Essays on Land, Leopold, and Conservation* (2004). He has recently edited for the Library of America the definitive collection of Leopold's writings, *Aldo Leopold: A Sand County Almanac and Other Essays on Ecology and Conservation* (2013).

He also serves as the on-screen guide in the Emmy Awardwinning documentary film Green Fire: Aldo Leopold and a Land Ethic for Our Time (2011). He has worked with a wide variety of conservation organizations across the U.S. and internationally. He is also active in his local landscape as a founder and member of the Sauk Prairie Conservation Alliance in Sauk County, Wisconsin.

Phenology: Recording Nature Observations

Phenology is the observance of cyclical and seasonal natural events. For millennia, these kinds of observations have been not only interesting and enriching to our human ancestors, but they have been critical to health and survival. Being successful with agriculture, hunting and gathering required an intimate connection to the natural world through careful observations and record-keeping.

In 2017, we are observing and documenting events related to weather, plants, and animals at Dyck Arboretum. With the help of visitors, we will record weather observations, presence/absence of migrating bird species, notable events with other forms of wildlife, flowering and seeding of plants, and more.

We invite you to help us document these phenological events by recording

your observations on a sheet in our Visitor Center entryway. At regular intervals, we will compile these observations and record them onto a large wall-mounted "phenology wheel". The phenology wheel concept was created by Partners in Place, LLC.

Be observant, take photographs and share them with us (arboretum@hesston. edu), write descriptive notes, make drawings, collect a leaf or flower, note dates and weather conditions; educate yourself by engaging with the natural world around you. Through your citizen science observations in 2017, this Dyck Arboretum phenology wheel will be an educational tool through which everyone will benefit.
